Expanding Capacity

Home Builders Foundation helped add capacity to shelters. Over 630 individuals find shelter in a facility HBF has built or renovated each year.

Securing Donations

Home Builders Foundation helped secure \$614,553 in product donations of construction materials to help alleviate the costs for shelter projects in 2020.





Capital Contributions

Home Builders Foundation provided cash contributions for shelter projects. In 2020, HBF donated \$133,850 in cash grants to support these projects.

Industry Scholarships
Home Builders Foundation offered scholarships for individuals working towards a career in the home building industry. To date, over \$300,000 has been awarded in scholarships.

DEAR FRIENDS,

Home Builders Foundation-HomeAid Portland is dedicated to the belief that every individual has worth and human dignity and deserves the basic provision of shelter. There are many reasons individuals and families find themselves without housing: the loss of a job, medical debt, increasing rental costs, or domestic violence, to name a few.

In addition to the growing homelessness crisis in our area, the economic downturn brought on by the global pandemic has caused job and income loss, food insecurity, and the isolation has caused an increase in substance abuse, mental health issues, domestic violence, and child welfare calls.

The burden on our nonprofit partners on the frontlines has increased, and they will need our help even more. We are grateful for our generous supporters who have helped us weather this challenging year and continue to make a difference in the lives of those who need it.

Founded in 1997 by Home Builders Association (HBA) of Metropolitan Portland, Home Builders Foundation (HBF) harnesses the resources and expertise of the home building industry to build and renovate shelters and transitional housing for those experiencing homelessness in our community. As a chapter of HomeAid, we do this through a unique approach that finds builders and remodelers through HBA and others in the industry who donate or heavily discount everything from labor to materials.

We partner with local service providers that provide housing for those experiencing homelessness in our community focusing on those most vulnerable on the streets - domestic violence survivors, families with children, veterans, and girls escaping sexual exploitation.

In 2020, despite the complications of Covid-19, Home Builders Foundation completed several projects including:

- Anisa's Place, a new home for girls escaping sex trafficking, with the help of over 60 trade partners providing over \$400,000 of in-kind donations
- A whole house remodel for Just Compassion, a resource center for houseless adults in Washington County
- Work continues at the Veteran's Village in Clackamas County where we added 11 new sleeping pods to expand its capacity

In addition, Home Builders Foundation is committed to building the workforce of the future through scholarships and educational opportunities for those interested in careers in the home building industry. We are continuing our support of the HomeAid WORKS program to assist the residents of our shelter partners to attend a free 10-week Pre-Apprenticeship Training Program with the goal to increase the likelihood of permanently exiting homelessness while addressing the construction labor shortage.

We can only accomplish this with the generosity and support we receive from our donors and project partners.

We believe everyone deserves a place to call home.

Shelter Provider: Do Good Multnomah

Builder Captain: Home Builders Foundation

Project Details: The Veterans Village project originated when HBF stepped in to relocate eight unused sleeping pods leftover from the Pod Build Challenge in 2019. Since then, numerous outside grants have helped extend the project to include building outdoor amenities (including planter boxes and a putting green), upgrading security, and building out the rest of the Village for a total of 30 sleeping pods.

The Clackamas County Veterans Village is a transitional sleeping pod village for Veterans who are working towards the goal of permanent housing. The Village is transitional shelter where residents have access to medical and dental care, mental health and substance abuse counseling, social services, employment assistance and training, and assistance to find permanent housing.

Each Villager has a pod which is designed for one resident and provides a safe space to sleep and store personal items. The Village also has a shared kitchen, bathroom/shower facilities and meeting spaces.

Population Served: Veterans

Project Retail Value (estimated): \$96,695

In-Kind Donations: \$46,126 (estimated) (48% of total Retail Value)

HBF Grants: \$50,569

Veterans represent 10% of Oregon's overall homeless population totaling over 1,300 individuals.



Shelter Provider: Just Compassion of East Washington County

Builder Captain: Greg Olson, Olson & Jones

Project Details: This multi-phased project began in March of 2018 in an overall effort to build out a day center and severe weather shelter for people experiencing homelessness in Tigard. The Resource Center officially opened its doors in June of 2018, although work continued into 2019 with a bathroom conversion, ductless HVAC system, exterior siding replacement and paint job, landscape improvement of the facade and addition of a wheelchair ramp.

The second phase beginning in late 2019 involved a total demolition of the downstairs space, and most importantly a major commercial plumbing upgrade featuring two bathrooms with showers, laundry room and space for overnight shelter.

Population Served: Houseless Adults

Project Retail Value: \$380,926

In-Kind Donations: \$203,311 (53% of total Retail

Value)

HBF Grant: \$57,750

Shelter Provider: True Housing

Builder Captain: Area Floors

Project Details: HBF teamed up with Brandy and Kelly Callaghan at Area Floors to transform the former Inn Home for Boys shelter in SE Portland. A bulk of the work was removing the soiled carpet in favor of brand new luxury vinyl plank flooring, and cove moulding throughout the nine bedroom facility and common spaces.

The project was completed in early January of 2020. A few weeks later, HBF and Rodda Paint completed painting most of the shelter for the 2020 Painting a Better Tomorrow. In April 2020, HBF staff were able to replace washers, dryers and refrigerators thanks to a donation from Taylor Morrison.

Population Served: Emancipated Youth

Project Retail Value: \$12,500

In-Kind Donations: \$4,000 (32% of total Retail Value)

HBF Grant: \$5,000

Within 18 months of emancipation, 40 – 50% of former foster youth become homeless.



Shelter Provider: A Village For One

Builder Captain: Jim Standring, Westland Industries

Project Details: This therapeutic home in Clackamas County was the ultimate vision of the growing A Village for One organization that serves teenage girls aged 12 to 17 recovering from commercial sexual exploitation. The seven bedroom house with six personalized bedrooms for girls as well as a 24-hour "house mom" suite is the first of its kind in Portland and is now the heart of the AV41 operation that now staffs about 20 care professionals that can help the girls get on the path to recovery over the course of a year's stay. The shelter is named for a local teenager Anisa Swearingen, who was brutally murdered by a convicted sex offender in 2012.

Sex trafficking is a major issue in Oregon, in large part because the state ranks number one in child homelessness. This shelter is a one-of-a-kind space for girls to get the care they need to recover from sexual abuse and trauma.

Population Served: Young women escaping sexual exploitation

Project Retail Value: \$837,170

HBF Grant: \$71,100

In-Kind Donations: \$407,242 (49% of total Retail Value)

DID YOU KNOW\$

The average age of entry into sexual exploitation is 12-14 years old, and Oregon is the #1 state in the nation for number of homeless children and sex offenders per capita, making our community's youth vulnerable to predators.



Shelter Provider: Do Good Multnomah

Builder Captains: Nathan Young, MODS PDX Inc.

Project Details: The planned transitional housing community located near downtown St. Johns features 19 sleeping pods and a central community building with kitchen, laundry, bathrooms, office and communal space. Each sleeping pod is a personalized space with enough room for a twin bed, storage, a radiant heating panel, wall plugs, overhead lights and a secure door with a key pad lock. The pods, designed by PSU Architecture students, are built to code with high-efficiency windows and proper insulation. Guests stay in the village up to two years, but often find permanent housing long before that.

The St. Johns Village project is a great example of a public-private partnership that brought together nonprofits, government agencies, the faith community and the building community to create a community effort to address the issue of homelessness in North Portland.

DID AON KNOMS

According to the City of Portland's 2019
Point-In-Time Count, the percentage of adults experiencing homelessness in the Portland Metro Area has risen 2.5%-3% each year over the past 10 years.

OTHER ACTIVITIES



Community groups sprang into action in 2020 to support local shelters and individuals who experienced hardship.

First off, HBA's Professional Women in Building council (pictured top left) led by Shelia Zentz-Stephens (Stephens Homes, LLC), Brandy Callaghan (Area Floors), and Julianne Sixel (Gotcha Covered) helped raise over \$4,000 for A Village For One with the "Lend A Handbag" online fundraiser.



Secondly, Mountainwood Homes families collected

gas and grocery gift cards, as well as donated clothing and toiletries to assist families

affected by the local wildfires at the end of Summer.

The wildfires also caused HBF to postpone the annual Trap mountainwood homes Shoot one day before the event. HBF Staff quickly found an

evacuation site and delivered over 100 pre-purchased hot meals (pictured bottom left) prepared by Slick's Big Time BBQ to the temporary residents displaced by this unexpected tragedy.

Earlier in 2020, Taylor Morrison found itself with a surplus of appliances, so they reached out to HBF and donated over \$80,000 worth of appliances to shelters in need. (Pictured bottom right)

Last, but not least, a group of amazing community members led by Susan Happ helped HBF's St Johns Pod Village by collecting over \$4,000 in donations to purchase all of the mattresses for the residents of this new shelter.







PAINTING A BETTER TOMORROW






Teams of painters worked together to paint five high-use homeless shelters in Portland – True Housing, My Father's House, Lincoln Woods (Human Solutions), Good Neighbor Center, and Rose Haven.

Along with Miller Paint and Rodda Paint – the event sponsors - a half dozen paint contractors and suppliers provided contributions in the form of supplies and labor. In total, in-kind support totaled more than \$16,430 for the day-long event.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Home Builders Foundation is committed to providing educational opportunities and training for tomorrow's workforce in the construction industry. Every year, HBF awards thousands of dollars in scholarships to high school students and post-secondary students who are interested in pursuing a career in the home building industry.





In 2020, Home Builders Foundation awarded \$13,000 in scholarships through its four scholarship funds:

- Northeast Oregon Scholarship Fund
- Professional Remodelers Organization

In 2020, Home Builders Foundation continues to partner with Constructing Hope, a pre-apprenticeship training program. Thanks to a genorous grant through the Lennar Foundation and HomeAid America's new HomeAid WORKS program, HBF will help cover tuition and other life costs (child care, transportation, food, etc.) for individuals trying to get out of transitional housing and need a new career path.




FINANCIAL IMPACT



In-kind donations of labor and materials are key to getting shelter projects completed. In addition, Home Builders Foundation gives cash grants to shelter projects when materials cannot be donated, when there are significant changes to the scope of a project, or when a shelter operator displays a need for additional project funding. These cash grants ensure that projects finish in a timely manner with as little financial impact on the shelter operator as possible.

In 2020, Home Builders
Foundation gave \$133,850
in cash grants to projects, in
addition to staffing support that
helps leverage in-kind donations
of labor and materials.

Home Builders Foundation leveraged \$614,553 worth of in-kind labor and materials for its completed projects in 2020.



Over 200 volunteers donated 1,500 hours of labor at the annual Painting a Better Tomorrow as well as other HBF sponsored volunteer events at Just Compassion Resource Center, Anisa's Place, and St Johns Village worth nearly \$38,049 in retail value.
